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The Shields of the Gods and Goddesses of Mount Olympus

Materials:

- cardboard
- aluminum foil
- heavy string or yarn
- black tempera paint


- · paper towels
- masking tape
- white glue
- scissors



After reading about the gods and goddesses, choose which one you would want to represent your life. Then, following the directions below, make a shield for that character.

Directions:

- 1. Cut the cardboard into a shield. A large circle is best, but other shapes can also be used.
- 2. Draw one of the gods' or goddesses' symbols on heavy cardboard. Some choices and their symbols are given below. Cut out the symbol and glue it onto the shield.



- 3. Make other designs around the symbol by gluing down pieces of string or yarn.
- 4. Spread glue over the shield. Cover it with aluminum foil.
- 5. Overlap the foil onto the back of the shield and cover the edges with masking tape to hold in place.
- 6. Press the foil gently into and around the cardboard shapes.
- 7. Paint on a light coat of tempera paint.
- 8. Wipe off the paint gently with a damp paper towel, leaving paint only in and around the symbol and design areas.
- 9. Cut a piece of cardboard for a handle and tape it onto the back of the shield.
- 10. Display the shields in the classroom.

Activities for "Prometheus"

Read the myth of Prometheus, who brought fire to mortals. After reading it, read the poem "Prometheus" by Lord Byron. (See page 25.) Review some of the vocabulary from the poem. When you are finished answer the questions.


