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Inferencing

Making inferences can be a very difficult but rewarding strategy for children to master. This section provides activities that will help students form conclusions based on textual or pictorial clues. Students will use hands-on matching activities that can be done in a small-group or a whole-class setting.



Suggested Books for Teaching Inferencing

Brett, Jan. The Mitten. New York: Putnam, 1989.

Nicki wants his grandmother to knit white mittens for him. She does it, but he loses one in the snow. Several animals make it their new home.

Fox, Mem. Tough Boris. San Diego, CA: Harcourt, 1994.

Boris may look like a mean and scary pirate, but when his parrot dies, he's as mournful as a regular person.

Munson, Derek. Enemy Pie. San Francisco, CA: Chronicle Books, 2000.

Jeremy moves into a new neighborhood and becomes "Enemy #1." Fortunately, Dad knows how to help—with pie!

O'Neill, Alexis. The Recess Queen. New York: Scholastic, 2002.

Mean Jean is the biggest bully on the school playground until a new girl arrives and challenges Jean's status as the Recess Queen.

Shannon, David. *David Gets in Trouble*. New York: Blue Sky Press, 2002.

When David gets in trouble, he has excuses right up until bedtime, when he realizes he really is sorry.

Activities for Inferencing

What Are They Doing?

This engaging activity will help your students practice this difficult reading skill. Copy What Are They Doing? (page 21) for each student. Have students read each sentence and look at the pictures at the bottom of the page. Have students use the clues in each sentence to determine which picture describes which sentence. Next, have students cut out the pictures and glue them next to the sentences that they describe.

What's Happening?

This beneficial practice page will allow your students to familiarize themselves with inferencing. Copy What's Happening? (page 22), one per student. Have students read each sentence and decide what the character is doing, using the clues provided in the sentence. Then have them choose a word from the Word Bank and use it in a complete sentence next to the sentence that it matches.

Inferencing Clue Cards

This culminating activity will allow students to practice inferencing independently. To begin, copy Inferencing Clue Cards (page 23) onto cardstock and laminate for durability. Cut them out. Then copy Inferencing Clue Cards Recording Sheet (page 24) for each student. Have students begin by reviewing each of the inferencing cards. Then have students match each inferencing card to the event it describes.
