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Introduction

The old adage "practice makes perfect" can really hold true for children and their education. The more practice students have with concepts being taught in school, the more success they are likely to find. For many parents, knowing how to achieve this goal and support their child's learning can be frustrating. This book is designed to eliminate the guesswork for parents using it at home, while also being a valuable resource for educators using it in the classroom.

Here's how: By pairing page-long texts in three different categories (fiction, nonfiction, and informational) with comprehension questions, students will get practice in encountering different text types and showing that they fully understand what they have read.

For Grade 6, Practice Makes Perfect: Reading Comprehension covers the following skills:

- using various reading strategies to comprehend text
- using context clues to determine the meaning of unknown words
- skimming text to quickly locate information
- locating the main idea of a text as a whole or of a part (paragraph, etc.) of a text
- making inferences and predictions based on information given

Inside This Resource

Reading Passages and Comprehension Questions (pages 4–39) — There are 18 reading passages that have been divided into three categories: fiction, nonfiction, and informational. These passages can be read sequentially or can be done out of order, as needed.

Practice Tests (pages 40–45) — There are 3 practice tests, one each for fiction, nonfiction, and informational texts.

Answer Sheets (pages 46–47) — These optional sheets provide a similar format to those found on standardized tests. These "bubble-in" answer sheets can be used in the classroom or at home.

Answer Key (page 48) — This key provides the answers for all of the comprehension questions that accompany the passages.

Helpful Tips

- Establish consistency by setting up a certain time of day to work on these practice pages. Look for times in your day or week that are less hectic and more conducive to practicing skills.
- Keep practice sessions short, positive, and constructive. If your child becomes frustrated, set the book aside and look for another time to practice.
- Provide extra guidance and support in the areas in which your child is struggling. Look for ways to apply these skills to real-life situations.



Protecting Nature and Ourselves

The choices humans make can have an enormous effect on the natural world. One person who was most instrumental in opening our eyes and our minds to this truth was Rachel Carson. In the decades that followed World War II, Carson was one of many great scientists who suspected that the chemicals humans used to make their lives easier were also doing great harm to our planet and to the animals and plants we share it with. What truly set Carson apart from the other scientists was her great skill as a writer. She was able to communicate her expertise to millions of people in a way that inspired them to care and to fight for change.

Carson's 1962 book *Silent Spring* is one of the most influential books about man's impact on our environment. She showed how man-made pesticides such as the once-popular DDT do more than just kill harmful insects. The chemicals work their way up the food chain, threatening bird and fish populations and ultimately entering the human population. Carson made it clear and understandable that we are not separate from nature; we are a part of it, and any poisons we put in nature may come back to poison us.



Silent Spring is considered Carson's greatest achievement, but before its release she had spent decades working as a marine biologist, studying habitats from the oceans to the treetops, and shining a light on what needed to be done to protect animal and human lives. Carson passed away less than two years after the publication of *Silent Spring*, but her words and warnings live on.

Taking Sides

Silent Spring caused a great uproar and inspired strong opinions. On the one side, Carson was attacked by the chemical industry. They spoke negatively about Carson's personal life and her abilities as a scientist. They tried to spread fear about a future without pesticides in which the world was overrun by destructive insects. On the other side, the public believed Carson's message and began to push for laws banning some pesticides. President John F. Kennedy also took Carson's words seriously. He started an advisory committee to look into the use of pesticides. Carson's work and the ideas it inspired eventually led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in 1970 and the banning of the use of DDT in 1972.
